LAST WEEK'S GUEST SPEAKER: Des Malcolm - "Blow into this please" - the development of the Breathalyser

Our Tiger Rag Reporter – Janice Kesterton, with many thanks.



Rotarian Des Malcolm, President Elect of the Rotary Club of Tullamarine, gave an interesting talk about the history of the development of this instrument – known as the breathalyzer - for breath testing for alcohol levels in licensed venues. The instrument originally had a cheap sensor which was developed in a laboratory in Wales. It looked rather like a fuse box. The Cain Government commissioned Dr John Nuenhausen to make the effects of drinking more open and to have breath testing in every licensed venue. The AHA (Australian Hotels Association) did not like this because of fear that it might stop people drinking!

In 1994/1995 the Monash Accident Research Centre was commissioned by the TAC (Traffic Accident Commission) to provide more of these. There were complaints that this instrument (called an 'anal' box!) looked like a fuse box and did not meet Australian standards. *[I looked up 'anal' in the dictionary, and one of its meanings is 'analytical' - Janice K.]*

Des stated, "Mr Tony Porter-Owen who worked on this box was an Anal Gas Engineer **not** a marketer!"

Des and his company spent \$1.24 million to make the software with an accuracy of + or – 10%. The margin is in favour of the driver, with results between 0.05 to 0.2%. Then pictograms were created to make it easy for people to use it at 3 a.m., after a night of drinking, instead of having pages of instructions to read.

Des commented that it is compulsory for hotels to have a *hand-dryer* on the premises, but not yet a breathalyzer, which would be much more useful for patrons!

Des and his company give the machines to hotels and charge \$ 2 for each test. They have been welcomed in Victorian country towns, such as Shepparton, Horsham, Ballarat and Bendigo and throughout NSW and South Australia - but not in the Melbourne CBD!


The death rates from car accidents in the areas where the analysers have been installed have been reduced considerably.



Professor Rob Room has worked on the effect of levels of alcohol on loss of inhibitions, and has found that it is clear that a level of 0.12 or above leads to loss of inhibitions that can lead to violence. Mr Mike Cochran, who was beaten up a few years ago, is running a campaign for 0.08 limit for pedestrians, but cannot get the legislation through.

The resistance to these machines is HUGE, especially by the AHA, despite evidence that shows that its use in Wollongong, across to Mossvale in NSW, has reduced the number of deaths, decreased the violence and decreased the incidence of drink driving!

These machines can help to educate the public re road safety and the time taken for alcohol levels to fall - which is approximately 0.01 per hour. A doctor's wife, tested after 2 glasses of wine, which she often drank before collecting her children from school, was found to be 0.08!

NOVEMBER IS ROTARY FOUNDATION MONTH – Rotary Foundation Thoughts...



1. **This Foundation thought** highlights the unique relationship between two **Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies Program (RPCS)** alumni. Raveendra Pathiranage, senior state counsel in the attorney general's office in Sri Lanka, and Thevananth Thevanayagam, program manager for the Refugees Rehabilitation Organization in Sri Lanka providing food, shelter, rehabilitation, and other assistance to Tamil refugees, found themselves unlikely classmates in the inaugural session of the RPCS Program. After arguing incessantly, the two formed a strong bond, united in a desire to bring peace to their homeland. "We erased the hard feelings and went on to 'What can we do to solve the problem? What can we contribute?'" said Pathiranage. The two remain close friends even a year after completing the three-month program, which Pathiranage describes as more useful than a year's worth of graduate study. **Every minute of every day somewhere in the world our Rotary Foundation is making a difference in someone's life.**
2. **This Foundation thought** is about **Health, Hunger and Humanity Grants (3H)**. In Romania orphaned and ill children are consuming donated eggs, milk, meat and poultry because of a grant from The Rotary Foundation that benefits local farmers. Farmers use the grant to buy everything from animal feed to packaging materials. There is one stipulation, the farmers have to donate a portion of their products to children's hospital, schools and orphanages. 3H grants fund large long-term international, grassroots projects. By contributing to The Rotary Foundation you are taking part in these grants. **The Rotary Foundation is our Foundation; it is critical that we take ownership of it and do what we can to change and save lives.**
3. **This Foundation thought** is about the impact of a **Group Study Exchange (GSE)**. For Stephen Rajamani, an insurance broker in Tamilnadu Province, India, the GSE experience was life-changing. Rajamani initially traveled to Brazil to learn about the culture and lifestyle and to learn about insurance practices there. His team visited many businesses, educational institutions and government offices. What Rajamani realized is that human beings are alike every where throughout the world, from the mayors and dignitaries who extended a warm welcome, to the host families who showered the team members with affection. Upon returning home, Rajamani became a member of the Rotary Club of Manapparai and showed his gratitude to The Rotary Foundation by becoming a Paul Harris Fellow in his first year. **Every Rotarian, Every Year** – be a part of it. Dear Club President and International Service Director,

The DIK Store at West Footscray has been the subject of much debate in D9800 ever since the corporate sponsorship of rental costs came to an end. Over its many years of operation the store has enabled Clubs to mount significant shipments of aid to our region, most recently of course to Samoa, the Philippines and the Victorian bushfire appeal. It also continues to provide a base for other Rotary programs.

Ongoing rental for the store at just under \$40,000 pa however remains a challenge. With help from the District and a number of Clubs, the rental is covered until mid 2010. The RAWCS team is seeking a new corporate sponsor. The RAWCS team believes it will be able to find a way of funding the store into the future, but at this point it is not guaranteed beyond mid 2010.

The District is keen to see a store remain a centrepiece of D9800's international service operations in future but wants to be sure that the current arrangements represent the best value for money regardless of who provides the funding.

Consequently the District Board today resolved to set up a review team of PDG Don Jago, PDG John Wigley, District Secretary Elect John McMorro and International Service Chair Alan Seale to examine the results achieved by the current store operation against its costs and compared to workable alternatives that would enjoy ongoing support from Rotarians across D9800. This team will need help from clubs and individuals with a stake in the store to help it come up with well-researched recommendations for the ongoing operation of DIK storage. Their report is due to be delivered by the January Board meeting.



Ray Martin needs no introduction. As the face of the *Midday Show*, *A Current Affair*, *60 Minutes* and *Carols by Candlelight*, he is instantly recognisable. Indeed, after forty-five years on our television screens many people feel that they have come to know him. But not many people know the real story behind Ray’s rise to stardom. His was an impoverished childhood; his world as far away from Hollywood and movie stars and the bright lights as is possible to imagine. Before he had even got to high school, Ray had lived in thirteen different places, in three Australian states, mostly in the bush. His father was a violent, drinking man who would lash out at his wife and children, ultimately forcing Ray’s mother to uproot the family across to the other side of Australia to escape him. Far from being crushed by his difficult childhood, though, Ray drew strength from his remarkable mother and sisters, and developed an irrepressible sense of humour. Here, now, in his own words, is the long-awaited, warts-and-all autobiography of Ray Martin: his exceptional career, his happy marriage to Dianne, and his lasting love affair with the people of Australia. Funny, thought-provoking and inspiring, this is the most compelling autobiography you will read this year.
