SPECIAL FEATURE –INTERNATIONAL CLUB PROJECT



GUEST SPEAKER, 24th May, 2010: Rotarian Barbara Woodberry (RCR's International Chair) - Report on East Timor Project. Chair – Pam Heath.

Barbara is a passionate person whose focus, amongst other things, is East Timor and the **Kindy Box Project**. She is the Richmond Rotary Club's International Chair and drives the Kindy Box initiative. Having returned from an April trip to the area, Barbara was booked as guest speaker to update us in regard to the Club's International Project and the outcomes of her visit to East Timor. Three special visitors came to the meeting to hear Barbara speak – PDG Ian Knight of the District 9800 Foundation Committee and PDG Jim Studebaker and his wife Carol, champions of the Kindy Box Project. In her introduction Barbara stated that assisting with this project in Timor 'is not about handing out money, it's about relationships, capacity building and listening to what people want/need'. She then went on to describe the success of the initial project and how other initiatives have evolved which are contributing to the betterment of kindergarten education in Timor.

The Kindy Box Project started with Barbara's first trip to Timor to seek out a project in July, 2008. On her return to the Richmond Rotary Club, she recommended that we assist with the resourcing of a group of kindergartens - and that the conduit for this project would be Sister Aurora Pires of the Canossian Congregation in Timor-Leste. Sr. Aurora had fostered a group of Directors and kindy teachers based in Dili and the west of the country. This group shared a common child and community-based philosophy of education. It was this group that the Club would help; in all, 35 classrooms and 60 teachers.

In the 2 years that the project has been going, 7 teacher resource boxes are now in place:

- A: CONSUMABLES
- B: WOODEN RESOURCES with the help of the Don Bosco organisation
- C: FINE MOTOR CONTROL
- D: HANDWRITING – Still not finished – ongoing material development
- E: MUSIC
- F: GROSS MOTOR CONTROL - hoops, skipping ropes etc
- G: CREATIVITY

Barbara described how two of the most sought-after products are the donated recycled materials: the plastic baker's buckets and the icecream tubs and containers – all used for storage, plus plastic, adhesive book covering to laminate their 'home-made' resources. The rodent problem in the villages and the humidity and rain, both pose a huge problem for the teachers. So you can image the teachers' delight now that they can laminate resources and also store them safe from attack! So valued donations for the project don't have to be just about money...and they don't have to be brand-new!

Another project dream is coming true – the existing kindergartens are acting as ‘satellites’, bringing in people from surrounding villages to pass on the skills of kindergarten teaching so that more kindergartens can open. And now we are moving to the next stage - supporting a second tier of Timor kindergartens!

Realising that sustainability would be impossible to achieve if the project only dealt through Sr Aurora, in May 2009 the kindy directors were invited to meet during a Club visit to Timor.

At this gathering they agreed to explore a more formal relationship. As a result TaLiHa was born - a network of Timorese Early Childhood Learning Centres.

TaLiHa stands for ‘Tau Liman Hamutuk’, which loosely translates to ‘put hands together’.

The aims of the group are to speak with one strong voice; to support individual Directors; to offer accredited training to their teachers and to ensure ongoing employment for their teachers. Each Centre is represented by their Director (mainly non-Timorese) and one Timorese staff member (the Assistant Director). TaLiHa meets formally every second month. They have already developed their Vision, Mission and Goals and Philosophy statement and have met 4 times.

Teacher training commenced last September with 30 Senior TaLiHa teachers embarking on a program of teacher education. Currently there is no ‘accredited’ training available for Kindergarten teachers in Timor.

The Australian Catholic University has a campus in Timor and they developed for TaLiHa a 4-module Certificate in Teaching. The first 2 modules (both psychology subjects) have been delivered during

term vacations and the first teachers will graduate in December 2010.

Barbara also identified the need for ‘hands on’ training in subjects such as reading aloud, fine motor coordination, handwriting, gross motor control etc. This training also links to the resources being supplied in the Kindy Box Project. For instance, for handwriting, the project supplies pencil grips, alphabet cards, flash cards, display posters, paper and a template for ruling lines. Barbara also decided to develop Teachers’ Manuals for each subject, which, once translated into Tetum (an Austronesian language - a national language and one of the two official languages of East Timor), become a potential resource for the wider community as well.

Barbara flew to Timor in April 2010 with Anne Fisher, a New Zealand volunteer, and they did the first 2 weeks of hands-on training. They taught 30 Senior and 30 Junior teachers in 2 groups.

Barbara also highlighted how she and Anne were constantly ‘thinking on their feet’ during the training. They started out to teach the topic, ‘how to teach handwriting’, only to discover that many of the kindy teachers didn’t have that skill themselves, at least not well developed skills! The TaLiHa teachers mainly live in villages with minimum need to write! So it was, ‘forget the lesson plan’ and ‘let’s switch to teaching them the base skill first’ exercise! Barbara and Anne were kept on their toes well and truly but rose to the task with their typical zeal and commitment!

Other creative items that the Kindy Box Project sent across were 'sand trays' with plastic animals and toy people that stand up in the sand, enabling children to play out a story. These were enthusiastically embraced! Marg Looker (FoRR - Past Rotarian Colin) went shopping for them back in January and ended up with new kitty litter trays and \$2 shop plastic figures that fitted the bill perfectly, with the sand being added in Timor!

"TaLiHa is now 'big on the lips' of people in the Ministry."

Barbara told us. "In April this year a small group of Senior Teachers were introduced to the Ministry. They are now sitting on working groups assisting in the development of EC policies."

Barbara continued, "Imagine the delight of these teachers when they recently met with Kirsty Sword Gusmao, wife of Xanana Gusmao, Prime Minister of East Timor. She sat with them on a working party and then took the group 'back home' for lunch!"

On the last night of training there was an Award Ceremony to present certificates. The Australian Ambassador and his wife, the Director General (DG) of Education and other members of the Ministry, plus Daryl Mills, the Rotary Liaison Officer, were all in attendance. Barbara wrote the basis of the Award Ceremony script and then the senior teachers 'made it their own', selecting the teachers who were to speak, they then practised in their own time. It was a highly successful evening and all present were very impressed with the caliber of those senior teachers.

The DG of Education spoke at length at the ceremony, thanking the Rotary Club of Richmond for their work. He praised what had been done to resource the schools and also spoke highly of the training and the results that he witnessed on the evening. This had a great impact on the teachers, raising their confidence and motivation. Barbara's role was to give a power-point presentation highlighting the work done by Rotary and others in Melbourne, emphasising the number of people involved.

The Future - This project is continuing into the next Rotary year, 2010-2011. Already new kindergartens are opening within TaLiHa and the cycle of Kindy Boxes is recommencing with new teachers. Barbara stated that the project is making a very significant impact on the lives of a group of Timorese children and is highly appreciated by the Timorese people touched by it. Of course this project has relied very much on the project supporters in Rotary and within the wider community who give freely of their time, effort and/or money, all driven along by Barbara with her zeal, enterprise and belief in the whole project.

Thank you - Chair for the evening, Pam Heath, warmly thanked Barbara on behalf of the Rotary Club of Richmond for her excellent project update. Pam then congratulated her for her personal dedication in driving this valued project and for helping to make such a difference to so many Timorese lives of today and tomorrow. *Hear, hear! Loud applause!*

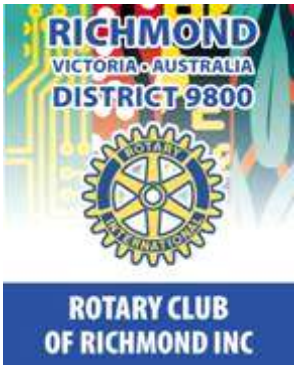

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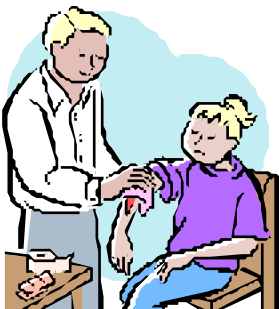

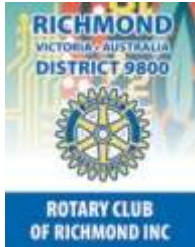
Dear All –

What year and why did you join Richmond Rotary?

A SYMBOL OF INTERNATIONAL FRIENDSHIP – THE WEMBLEY WHEEL

The Wembley Wheel of Friendship trophy dates back to 1964 and has been passed to each new club within Rotary District 9800. The Rotary Club of Melbourne Park is the newest club to receive it. Prior to this it was in the keeping of the Port Melbourne Rotary Club,

then the Docklands Rotary Club, chartered in June 2009. District Historian, John Meehan, explained to the gathering at the Melbourne Park Club Charter Dinner on Wednesday, 26th May 2010, that the tradition was exclusive to Rotary District 9800. It harked back to the 1930's and the Second World War when a number of Essendon Rotarians became personally connected with the Wembley Club in the UK.

The bonds between Wembley and Essendon continued to grow and were formally recognised when Wembley Rotarian, Ted Garner, had the wheel made and presented it to the Essendon Club in 1964. The Wheel was on loan to Essendon Rotary as part of its recent 75 years celebrations. It returned to Docklands before being presented to the newly-chartered Melbourne Park Club for safe keeping for the *next* District 9800 Charter Club!
