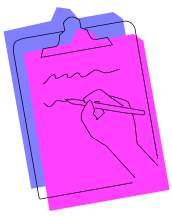

His Topic: Future Vision – RI Foundation

“All over the world there are people who rely on the Rotary Foundation for the chance of a better life for them and their family.” stated PDG John Davis at the end of his address to Richmond Rotary last week. “In the 2011-2012 Rotary year they will rely on you to ensure that once again your club continues to support the Rotary Foundation.” He also claimed that ‘without the Rotary Foundation, Rotary International would only be a shadow of the Rotary we know today’.

Why then are significant changes being made to the Rotary Foundation under the **Future Vision pilot program** which involves 100 Districts world-wide over a 3 year period? While the current Foundation model has been very successful the way its grant structure has been implemented, along with many of its programs, they have had only minimal changes since their inception in 1917. **Future Vision Pilot** offers clubs and Districts more control over fund allocation and provides greater flexibility in decision making. It allows clubs and Districts to respond more quickly to urgent needs, both globally and locally, while providing greater efficiencies and impact on the programs and projects undertaken by clubs and Districts supported by The Rotary Foundation. For Districts involved in the pilot program, global grants can only be obtained from the Rotary Foundation if the project or program is between Pilot Districts or clubs in those Districts. Clubs are however able to develop projects and programs with non-pilot Districts in the 3 years of the pilot program. However any funding for these projects would need to be provided by our District or clubs. John said that over the 3 year period of the pilot program the Foundation has asked Pilot Districts and their member clubs for feed back on any matters concerning the new grant process - so that issues can be resolved before the changes become mandatory for all Districts on the 1st July 2013. He welcomes and encourages all feed back as District Rotary Foundation Chair,

John said “Clubs in D9800 have been very supportive both in time and funding to the Rotary Foundation, however we could do better with the ‘Every Rotarian Every Year’ program, which is an individual’s contribution to the Foundation of a suggested \$150 Australian per year every year.” He added that 10 of our members contribute to the ‘Every Rotarian Every Year’ program.

The Future Vision Program has 6 specific areas of focus which are fundamental in whether a global grant will be provided by the Rotary Foundation: Peace and Conflict resolution/Maternal and Child Health/ Water and Sanitation/Education and Basic literacy/Economic & Community Development/Disease Treatment & Prevention

What should clubs be doing to be part of the Future Vision Program?

- Review their current or envisaged grant program to see whether it complies with the 6 areas of focus, if it doesn’t it will not qualify for a Global grant, however it may be approved for a District Grant.
- Review or develop further their grant program for the 2010-2011 year, District 9800 would like to hear of Club plans with an estimate of funding required as soon as the concept is approved by the Board

- Play a role with the District Foundation Committee in shaping the final version of the new grants model.
- Become a qualified club in order to receive a Foundation grant by agreeing to the terms and conditions as set out in the club MOU

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Gone fishin'! **DARWIN – LAST WEEK OF APRIL 2011.**

16 blokes from a variety of backgrounds & locations arrived into the city of Darwin, over 2 days, from Melbourne and Brisbane. The group had grown from 12 in 2010 and from the original 8 in 2008. We overnighted at Darwin's BARRA BASE - BED and BREAKFAST in Malak – a suburb of Darwin. Friday up at 4.00 am for a safari drive, with the 4 boats, to Dundee – 2 ½/3 hrs west of Darwin – on the edge of the Timor Sea.

Four fishers per boat plus guide and a beach launch by tractor to start the 2 day fishing experience. Two boats were to work the sea reefs offshore and the other two travelled up the Finnis River in search of the great Barramundi!

The weather was perfect – light breezes and 32° C. Up the Finnis the breeze dies out and the heat can be fierce. End of day 1 saw only a couple Barramundi and a good haul of reef fish.

Day 2 all boats stayed offshore, meeting at the change of tide up the Finnis River at 2.30 pm. Reef fishing was good and the hole up the Finnis was productive for Mulloway [Jewfish] – 30 to 45lb, and several brought aboard.

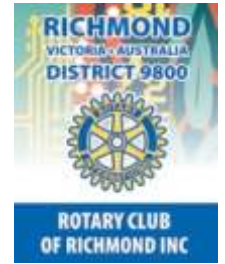
5:00 pm ashore at Dundee, clean boats and fish and return to the Darwin's Barra Base. Half of the group were returning to Melbourne Sunday 1st May, fish for all, packed chilled in fish-box containers – approx 8 kg for each fisherman. A brilliant trip with the wide range of different business and work backgrounds experiencing an enjoyable 3 days of Top End time!

Friendships renewed, new friends made – a true reflection on what makes Australia such a wonderful place to be.

✓ **We welcomed more special ROMAC visitors to last week's meeting!** John Benger, Southern Director of Rotary Oceanic Medical Aid for Children (ROMAC) brought along a delightful little ROMAC patient, Theary Sokum from Cambodia (pictured cuddled up to 'Aunty Jo'). She was accompanied by her lovely mother, Vesna Sokum, and Shirley Sokum, her doting aunt. Included was Peter Twomey of the Rotary Club of Pascoe Vale. (See group pictured) 'Rescued from the streets of Cambodia with a birthmark obscuring her face, Theary Pen Chan Sokun has endured much hardship in her short life. But things are looking up after the Pascoe Vale Rotary Club arranged to fly the five-year-old to Melbourne for life-changing surgery to remove the



potentially cancerous birthmark. The congenital hairy nevus covering Theary's right cheek and nose was predicted to lead to eyesight problems and possible brain tumours. The mark also attracted stares and taunts and left her ostracised. ...Through Peter Toomey, ROMAC arranged for plastic surgeon Tony Holmes - who helped separate Bangladesh's conjoined twins Trishna and Krishna - to perform the surgery at Mercy Private Hospital at no cost to the family. The Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation has risen in community stature and has spread from a partnership with Cultivating Community at Collingwood College to now include over 20 schools. The Yarra Primary School was an early participant. The growth in school kitchen gardens has reached phenomenal levels, though it is tinged with struggles to create and sustain gardens. Many teachers are actively teaching children how to grow their own food and cook meals out of it, with students learning vital links between food and the environment at the same time.

Committed to sustainable and environmentally friendly practices, Yarra PS is today a thriving Kitchen Garden School. Since its inception in 2007, the Kitchen Garden Program has become a feature of the school, encouraging social, physical, moral and intellectual development in the children. It is a source of pride for the local community and the beautiful Yarra PS garden has achieved a number of State garden awards.

Jude Sullivan has been the driving force behind the Yarra PS Kitchen Garden. She is the main liaison contact for the Richmond Rotary Club which has been involved as a major sponsor of this project since its earliest days. The volunteer effort from Richmond has been led from the start by our President, Jo Cowling, supported by many other members over the 4 or so years since the garden started. Donations from our Club have funded a range of gardening projects and our members have been hands-on involved with the garden on a number of working bees.

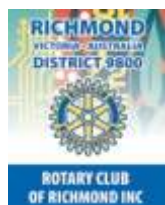
