President's message:

President Jean Marc was unable to give the editor his message this week.

Last week's speaker: David Langdon – The History of Richmond

David, a member of the Richmond Historical Society (RHS), gave a fascinating illustrated talk on the history of Richmond from its earliest days.

The Wurundjeri people were the first owners of this country, and are still the custodians of its cultural heritage. Since Melbourne's settlement in 1835, the landscape has changed dramatically from pristine bushland to a thriving metropolis. The growth of Richmond has continually evolved from large estates and mansions, to the development of major industries and homes for many of their employees working in the area. Its location provides easy access to water, materials, transport and labour. Many household name companies were based in Richmond; e.g. Skipping Girl, Kiwi Boot Polish, Bryant & May, Peters Ice Cream and of course, Slade



Knitwear. Today, the large factories, warehouses and industrial sites have been transformed into offices, apartments and retail outlets. A far greater emphasis on service industries has replaced much of the manufacturing and production that was here in the past.

The RHS recently facilitated the celebration of Richmond's 150th anniversary on becoming a municipality and has been preparing for the 150th anniversary of Australia's first aerial journey which took place in Cremorne in Richmond in 1858. On Friday 1st February, with the City of Yarra, the RHS hosted a re-enactment of the first balloon flight in Australia. This included up to seven hot air balloons, a community breakfast, historical display, unveiling of a plaque and a commemorative balloon launch.

RCR East Timor Project. Exciting news – the board have agreed to sponsor an international project in East Timor. Centered around a kindergarten in Dili, it has great synergy with our Boroondara Kindergarten Project.

One part of the project involves 'building and volunteering' - an outdoor community meeting hall, water tanks, shed, garden and play ground. This will be undertaken in conjunction with other clubs.

The second part is a long term commitment to kindergarten education in East Timor using 'our' kindergarten' as the conduit. It will involve supplying essentials such as crayons, chalk and pencils; and educational toys such as building blocks, jigsaws and puppets.

We will also be commissioning blackboards and easels from local (Dili) small tradesmen, endeavouring to put part of the money we raise into the local community. One other aspect will be a commitment to the education of local girls as kindy teachers.

The exact nature of this on-going project will evolve as we set up communication channels with local personnel and they tell us more about what they need. This will probably require an exploratory trip to Dili. Barbara Woodberry and Jill Forsyth (RC of Kew) are jointly managing this project.

This is a project for EVERYONE in the club. A committee is being formed – if you are interested in any aspect of this project please let Barbara know.
